IV, your son. You saw him come into this world and you didn't even see him leave it forever. War didn't even return his body: You were forced to bury an empty casket. You son was resourceful, the best at whatever he did. To you, he was perfect. The news of his death destroyed you: The years pass, but you still can't shake off the thought that he may still be... Maybe he still needs you. Though you didn't want to come here, the others' insistence won you over in the end.

III was your friend. Then he took the love of your life away from you. You couldn't hold a grudge against the light of your eyes, but he was a whole other story. When he went off with the army, you wished him all the worst. When you saw him again, he was inside a casket.

II often helped your son through hard times. Even when he ran away from you. You may have been too demanding of him, but he owes you for whatever he's become. Whatever he had become. But with _II_'s help, things always got better. Except for this wretched war.

I was someone you liked. He had talent, though not as much as your kid. But he held a great pain inside him. He seemed perturbed the last time you ever spoke.

Reception

- Play to find answers to the questions written on your Placecard.
- Since there are no Names, the Extended family sheet should help you make sense of relationships. You can look at it whenever you need to.
- Give the Veteran a Memento and its Signal only when another Relative encourages you to do so.
- Remember to always give Signals in increasing numerical order, from I up to IV.
- Reject as lies the Messages from the Veteran when they come with a Memento.
- Accept as intimate truths the Messages from the Veteran with no Memento attached.

Transmission

- Choose a single Relative to pair up with for the current phase.
- Use this moment to vent instead of focusing on comforting the others.

Epilogue

- Once the Veteran speaks the Name, keep quiet and follow his lead.
- Line up with the other Relatives. You will get to bid the Fallen farewell through gestures alone.
